The Newburgh Plan

We mentioned not long ago the Newburgh plan of handling welfare cases. In brief the mayor of that New York City ordered that no more public aid be extended to able bodied men unless they earn it by manual labor.

For some reason we have not been able to fathom, this declaration stirred up a lot of opposition from the higher-ups. Even from Governor Nelson Rockefeller of the Empire State in which Newburgh is located as we have stated.

But out in Iowa, two cities have already followed thru on the Newburgh idea. One is Des Moines. The other is Cedar Rapids. Only last week, the Cedar Rapids papers told of 25 persons who have been removed from the Linn County relief

rolls because they did not appear for work detail as instructed.

There is a great deal of under-cover belief thruout the nation that our county welfare agencies are often too generous. This applies more to the larger counties, particularly those in which there are centers of population.

It is our candid belief that if more of these cities would adopt the Newburgh system, they'd save the taxpayers a great deal of money—and they might get a lot of city loafers and booze-hoisters to lead useful lives.

Stamping Out Churches

How the communists are slowly but surely moving to exterminate Christian churches in the satellite countries is a feature in a recent issue of "News and Views in the World of Religion."

It speaks of the situation in Rumania and Bulgaria. According to the news letter, "an estimated 72 per cent of Rumania's 16 million population and 88 per cent of the 7 millions of Bulgarians belong to the Orthodox church."

These are keeping up a showing of church activities. But we quote from the news letter:

"In both countries the drive for 'modernization' according to communist conceptions is intense and every means of propaganda and political, social and legal pressure is used to enforce conformity. The churches are under this pressure no less than other public institutions. The law allows them to 'perform their religious rites,' but all their former social activities and programs have been stripped away."

"The churches are allowed extremely few contacts with the outside world. The communist parties are intensifying anti-religious propaganda of many kinds to which the churches are not allowed to make any public reply."

"The whole educational system is based on Marxist-Leninist philosophy. Public support of the government's general policies is the condition for the continuation in office of the leadership of any organization."

Which gives a graphic picture of what the communies are doing, or attempting to do, in all nations under the Russian heel.

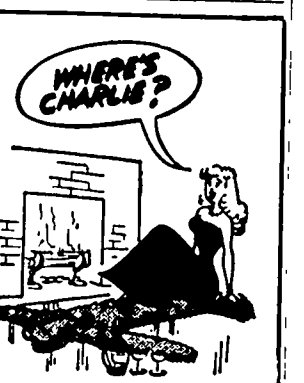
Yearbooks For Sale

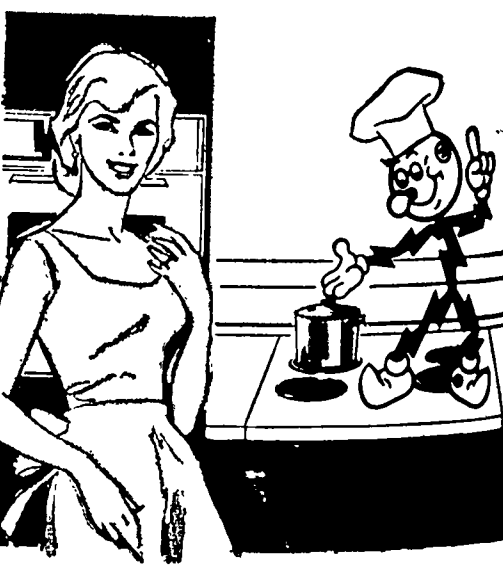
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
